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

# History of the Early Childhood Self-Assessment Tool for Shelters

- Developed at the U.S. Administration for Children and Families (ACF) 2014.
- Created to provide resources and information to help shelters support families with young children.
- Validated by Sara Shaw, Ph.D., of ChildTrends, while completing her dissertation at the University of Delaware, under adviser Rena Hallam.
- In 2019, a focus group of early childhood experts reviewed Shaw's findings and recommended revisions.
- In early 2020, Child Care Services Association (CCSA) completed those revisions and worked with ACF to roll out the revised edition.



# Design of the Early Childhood Self-Assessment Tool for Shelters

Individuals or small groups in a shelter use the tool to assess:

Health & Safety Wellness & Development

Programming Workforce Standards & Training

Food & Nutrition

- Each section has multiple items to assess the environment and the program.
- Shelters then design action plans based on their findings.








# Supporting Young Children Experiencing Homelessness -- A Pilot Project

CCSA and Partners for Impact (PFI) are collaborating to provide assistance to shelters completing the *Early Childhood Self-Assessment Tool for Shelters* and to connect them with early childhood programs, in support of young children and families experiencing homelessness.







## **Project Goals**

- To make the validated *Early Childhood Self-Assessment Tool for Shelters* accessible to shelters across the United States.
- To support community building and collaboration between early childhood and housing/homelessness practitioners.
- To strengthen and enhance environments to create child-friendly spaces for young children and families in shelters.
- Enroll children who are experiencing homelessness in high quality early care and education programs.





## **Project Activities**

- Provide training and technical assistance to shelters and transitional housing programs serving families with children ages 0-5.
- Use the *Early Childhood Self-Assessment Tool for Shelters* to help shelters create environments that promote the development of young children.
- Encourage shelters and local early childhood programs to collaborate so that children can enroll in high quality early care and education.







#### **Shelters in the 2021 Pilot**

- Two cohorts of two shelters each
- Three family shelters and one domestic violence shelter
- Western, Northwest, Central and Eastern North Carolina
- Rural, urban, and semi-urban








# **Year One Planning**

- Several steps were needed to launch the pilot project:
  - A logic model
  - Applications, MOUs, and other forms
  - Marketing Materials
  - "Pre-test" and "post-test"
  - Incentives
  - Structure for meetings, interviews and self-assessment process

## **Lessons Learned**

- Recognize and honor the history, values, priorities, and capacities of each shelter
- Be flexible work at the speed of the shelter
- Determine how to provide the benefit without increasing the burden
- Incentives matter, even small amounts of money
- The impact can go beyond the immediate improvements
- Celebrate the wins
